Minutes of 2023 Triennial Meeting and Dinner The Pilgrim William White Society

September 11, 2023 6:30 p.m. Hotel 1620, John Carver Room Plymouth, Massachusetts

Guests were welcomed by Governor Patrick White and invited to sign in. 38 members and guests were in attendance, a quorum being present.

The 2023 Triennial meeting of the Pilgrim William White Society was called to order at 6:55 p.m. by Governor Patrick White who observed that 2023 marks the 10th anniversary of our family's society.

Governor White thanked the hotel for the meeting arrangements, the Francis Cooke Society for sharing our exhibit table, and our guests for the evening, author Stephen O'Neill and Tim Davidson, of the Marshfield Historical Society and Mrs. Davidson.

Governor White stated that Corresponding Secretary Ken Whittemore could not attend due to the health concerns of his wife. Sympathy was expressed for the family of Suzanne Ress who has passed away.

Governor White presented our newest member Helen Krispien with her membership certificate.

Elder Alan Smith presented the invocation. Captain Chuck Provost led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Governor White reported on the state of the Society, membership, recipients of our donations, and significant contributions of researchers. The report is attached.










A Tour of Tickhill

Richard Jackson was licensed in 1591 as schoolmaster of the grammar school in Tickhill. Sue Allan states that the location of his school is uncertain, but that it could have been located in a former side chapel of the church. In 1548 the Chantry of St. Elyn in the church provided the revenues for the salary of the schoolmaster at 4 pounds 18 shillings and 11 pence.

Although facing dissolution in 1548, the school survived. (Allan, Steps Along the

The Other Rock

Plymouth Rock is part of our enduring heritage. But many people are unaware of Plymouth's Sacrifice Rock that lies in a micro-park adjacent to the sprawling Pinehills residential complex on the well-traveled Old Sandwich Road that connected Sandwich on Cape Cod to Plymouth. This historic road was first used as a path by the Wampanoag Indians and is the second oldest public road in the United States.

This venerable rock was given to the Plymouth Antiquarian Society in 1928 and



is steeped in Wampanoag and other indigenous people's Indian lore and legend. According to Plymouth resident and historian, James Baker, "The Indians paid homage to the spiritual forces associated with the boulder by dropping a simple branch with green leaves as they passed on their way between Sandwich and Plymouth, just as stones are dropped on cairns or heaps in less wooded regions of the world. It was a gesture of sacrifice made to receive the blessing of a safe journey." Although nothing is recorded to indicate our Pilgrim ancestors were aware of Sacrifice Rock, Baker says they may have heard of it from the local Herring Pond Comassakumkarit tribe. These Indians were part of the Wampanoag nation.

A monument with the inscription "Manittoo Asseinah" the Indian name meaning God's Rock is clearly visible atop the sprawling rock. "It's not possible to accurately explain the significance of "Manittoo" or "Manitou"; the Indians' sacred force, but it encompasses the spiritual power and relationships that pervade the world in addition to referring to the hazily personified Great Spirit." He continued by saying, "The spiritual current exists everywhere, but is found in a more concentrated manner in certain people, places and things. Here at Sacrifice Rock the "Manittoo" was very evident and respected."

The custom of leaving branches with green leaves endures, however, today small



stones are also found adorning the rock. So,

the next time you visit Plymouth, stop at 394 Old Sandwich Road, and don't forget to bring an offering of a tree branch or a small stone as you pay homage.

The Descendants of Jonathan and Mary Buffum Wheeler

Hello cousins! It was good to see and meet several of you at the PWWS dinner in Plymouth! Here is a little article about some more cousins.

Jonathan and Mary Wheeler lived in the little town of Berlin, Massachusetts. Berlin used to be part of Bolton, Massachusetts. It is part of Worcester County. It was a farming community. Our line goes as follows:

William White m Susanna Jackson Resolved White m Judith Vassall Elizabeth White m Obadiah Wheeler Jonathan Wheeler m Mary Fletcher Jonathan Wheeler m Thankful Baker Jonathan Wheeler m Mary Buffum

As you can see there are several Jonathan's in the family. Jonathan and Mary had 11 children, of which 5 had descendants. They were Daniel Wheeler (he has the most descendants), Elizabeth, Ruth (her line ended in about the 1920's), Mary, and Jonathan.

Every year, starting in 1859, at the end of the harvest, the family would gather



for a time of meeting and eating. This turned into what we now call a family

reunion. On the third meeting, they decided to elect officers. This past August we celebrated our 164th Wheeler Family



Gathering. Yes, we met during Covid via our first Zoom Meeting. We now are meeting in person and have Zoom available for those who cannot attend in person. We had a study done to see how we placed regarding holding the longest family



reunion. We found out we ranked third in the country and second in the state of Massachusetts. Not bad for a farming family.

One other note about this branch of cousins. They were Quakers. They started as part of the Salem Society of

Friends and then Uxbridge. In 1799 they were later granted permission to hold their own meetings in Bolton. They had 130 members. Land was donated and they built their Meeting House. They grew, but as time went on their numbers diminished. On February 28, 1931, they merged with The Baptist Church and The First Parish Church to form the Federated Church in Bolton, Massachusetts. Their Meeting House was standing empty. Old Sturbridge Village in Sturbridge Massachusetts was interested in the Meeting House. In 1952, The Quakers deeded the Meeting House to Old Sturbridge Village. When the meeting house was being disassembled, the men numbered each

board so it would be put back together properly. My grandfather, Ernest Eldon Wry, was one of the men who helped in disassembling, moving, and reassembling the Meeting House to Old Sturbridge Village. It is still there today. (The original Meeting House had one entrance. Later a second entrance was added so there was one entrance for the men and one for the women. Old Sturbridge Village wanted it as the original, so it is back to one entrance.) There is a marker in Bolton where the old Meeting House stood.

One last note about the Quakers. For their burial grounds, they would place



stones, not markers, to mark when their loved ones were buried. Families would be buried together. The Wheelers were first buried in The Old

Fry Burying Ground that was established in 1779. They later established the Bolton Society of

Peregrine White Weathervane By Cousin Jean Seeley

This past Spring, I was fortunate enough to return once again to Plymouth and the surrounding area. I've been to this



part of Massachusetts several times since learning I am a Susannah and William White descendant through their son Resolved. I try to find new discoveries with every visit, especially given I live 3,000 miles away! Some of the places I always try to visit besides the usual Pilgrim related sites are located in nearby Marshfield. For starters, I try to visit City Hall in Marshfield, where atop a very tall steeple is a

weathervane in the likeness of Peregrine White. Peregrine is astride a horse and as legend has it, being a dutiful son, he is on his way to see his mother, Susannah White Winslow.

After seeing this weathervane for the first time, probably 20 plus years ago, I wanted to learn more about the Peregrine weathervane so I stopped into Marshfield City Hall. After getting gently redirected to




different departments, I eventually found the right office where a kind employee told me the weathervane artist was Ann Hall and that she lived nearby. I located her address and wrote her a letter letting her know how much I

enjoyed seeing her weathervane. Over the

course of a few letters, I eventually got up my nerve and asked her if there was any way I could get the blueprints for the weathervane so perhaps I could have one made for my house 3,000 miles from Marshfield. She kindly set me the blueprints and a few weeks later I found someone who was willing to make me an exact copy out of sheet metal. I didn't opt to have it attached to a weathervane, but instead, I hung it near my front door of my colonial style home in Washington state. After I'm gone, I hope one of my kids will value it as much as I have!

I no longer have the blueprints for the weathervane and I'm pretty sure Ann Hall has passed away, but if you ever visit Plymouth or Boston and you have time, you can see the original on top of the city hall building in Marshfield. I suggest bringing binoculars as it's really high up! Here's the address of city hall: 870 Moraine St, Marshfield, MA 02050


